I look at the little people in Miss Turk's room and I see how confidently they arrive at school, taking care of their own materials.

I visit Miss Johns' classroom and I hear children, who ten weeks ago had to really concentrate to sound out a 3-letter -word, beginning to read longer sentences and words with lots of letters. I see them counting confidently, knowing the next number without having to think about it, and I see them looking at the posters and using the other learning materials in the classroom to answer their own questions and help them learn independently.

I see how our senior students have grown in maturity and self-management skills and have become independent workers. They have responded so enthusiastically to the choices and independence that Miss Stevens encourages, and their classroom has a hum of concentration and learning. (If you go in and visit during lessons one day, I guarantee you will hear it too!)

I am excited by the way our Year 6 students, and our Year 5s too, are growing into their role as student leaders, taking on responsibility, being aware of what other people need, and showing compassion towards others.

Then I realise it hasn't been a short term after all – it has been a term of 'flow'. Flow is what we might call 'being in the zone', when we are so fully absorbed in what we are doing, that we lose track of time. Flow requires tremendous concentration, but it feels effortless. It occurs when the balance between our skill and the level of challenge we are taking on is just right.

To find that point of challenge, and to adjust it carefully so that it is exactly right for each learner, is a teacher's job. We know when we have achieved it because of the feeling of energy, the buzz or hum, that fills the class. It's an exciting feeling.

So it hasn't been a short term at all! It has been 45 days (or 14 400 instructional minutes!) of concentrated teaching and learning. So much growth, so many connections made between the neurons in our brains. It's been a great term!

Teaching for Impact at Coorow Primary School

We all know that every child is different, and every family is different. Every child comes to school with different strengths and interests and, as teachers, we do our best to meet each child and provide them with the things they need to be successful learners.

Educational researchers tell us that in schools, of all the things that we can control, the most powerful is teacher quality. The better the teacher, the more the students learn. We are so lucky at Coorow – all of our teachers are great teachers, but we are also learners, so we are working hard to become even better.

The Department of Education has published a document called *Teaching for Impact. Teaching for* Impact sets out what effective teachers believe, know and do, and describes all the elements that need to come together for students to make the best progress.

The teachers at Coorow are currently working our way through *Teaching for Impact*, making sure that we have everything in place at our school, with whole school programs, consistent expectations, and high-quality planning, teaching and assessment. That way, we can be sure that our practices are of the highest standard and our students will have the best opportunity to learn every day and to have seamless transitions between teachers and between year levels as they move through the school.

Attendance

What can you do to help your child succeed at school? Plenty of good, nutritious food and plenty of sleep, lots of talk and play between adults and children, development of independence and selfmanagement skills, maintaining an informative relationship with their teacher, and home reading every night are all very effective ways to help your child. But the most important thing you can do is to make sure that they are at school every single day unless they are sick.

Days away from school really add up. Even a child attending 90% of the time is missing 1 day per fortnight – that is the equivalent of 5 days per term, or 20 days (4 whole weeks) per year off school. Over 13 years of schooling, that adds up to nearly 1.5 years!

A child attending only 80% of the time misses an average of a day each week. That adds up to more than 2.5 years over their 13 years of schooling.

That is like finishing school in the middle of year 10. Obviously, missing so much school will really limit their chances of success.

Our progress towards attendance targets

We describe regular attendance as being here more than 90% of the time. However, when attendance falls below 90%, we know that a child is at risk of not reaching their educational potential. We currently have:

- 27 children attending regularly (that is an improvement and we are approaching our target this semester of 30 students)
- 5 children at indicated risk (80-90% attendance); and
- 5 children at moderate risk (70-80% attendance).

Let's work together to achieve our target of 30 students attending regularly next term.

92% of absences at present are authorised (i.e. considered reasonable). That is a <u>huge</u> improvement from the time I wrote the last newsletter when only 55% were authorised. I set a target of 85% at that time, so we are easily exceeding that target now! Targets should be challenging to achieve, so I will increase our target for authorised absences in Term 2 to 95%.
