

Principals Professional Review

I recently undertook the Principal's Professional Review. This is a new process in the Education Department. It's similar to performance management, except that it requires a principal to gather evidence and reflect on their performance in their role over the last three years, and to plan for future improvement.

Like the Public School Review (another self-review that many of you may remember from 2021 - and that we get to do again in 2024) it is a challenging process but it is well worth completing because it makes you think deeply about every aspect of what you do. And like the PSR, the process ends with a visit from two reviewers who discuss the

evidence and the principal's judgements about their performance and their planned improvements.

As part of the reviewers' visit, I had to prepare a short speech to introduce myself, give a bit of information about my background, and explain my beliefs about education. I thought I would like to share some of my speech with you, so that you can understand a bit more about me and why I do what I do. It's all about learning, about growth, about improvement, and about being the best that I can be. Those are the same things that we say to the children every day!

Since commencing my teaching career in 1984, I have been lucky enough to teach in some amazing areas of the state. I've taught in the city, and in some extremely remote areas; in some of the biggest schools - one that had over 980 students - and in some of the smallest. I've taught children from all cultures and all backgrounds and loved learning from and with them all.



Our vision

At Coorow, we strive to do our best. We are confident and resilient. We laugh and learn and grow together.

I became principal unexpectedly in 2018, and at first, I had absolutely no idea what I was doing! I found that very stressful because it is important to me to be capable and confident and good at what I do. Now I am half-way through my sixth year - in that time I have asked a lot of questions, sought a lot of support, done a lot of professional learning, made and fixed a lot of mistakes, taken a lot of advice, acted on a lot of uncomfortable feedback, and I think I am getting there! There is still a lot I want to learn and do, though!

I believe that one of my strengths is continually learning and seeking new knowledge. I am, first and foremost, an educator, and I find the new discoveries in the neuroscience of learning fascinating. I am keen to share the new things I learn with the staff and work with them to find ways to apply them. I also love the new field of evidence-based practice (observation and measurement to find out what works best in classrooms) and have loved the opportunity to lead its implementation in our school.

I have also discovered a strength that I would never have expected in fostering the school development cycle, and engaging teachers and families in the process. I love collecting the evidence that shows what we are doing well and what we need to work on, that evidence helps us to develop plans, and the plans drive our actions, and then we review - and the review provides the evidence for the next cycle, as we work towards making the school better.

It's really important to me to develop relationships with parents. I want all the parents to know that we are walking beside them as their children grow and develop. I will sit and listen if they have worries and offer support, if I can, when it is needed. I will work to mentor, challenge, and extend their children, in academic areas, but also in real-world skills like problem solving, assessing risk and managing their own behaviour. And I want them to know that the teachers and I celebrate with the children when we see their learning and their growth.

When I became a principal, I missed the classroom and the students and especially the feeling that I could make a difference. I always knew that I did not, and could not, make a difference to everyone every year, but every few years, there would be that one student that I could make the big difference for. It's taken a long time for me to realise that I still make a difference. I can make a difference for every teacher and every family because, as principal, I am the one that provides the right conditions the environment where teachers and parents receive the support that they need to grow great kids who do their best; where teachers feel validated and trusted and they want to strive to be the best that they can be; and where everybody, staff and students, parents and community members, feel that this is their school.

And I realise now that I can still make a difference, not just for 'that one student', but for every student. I want every child in my care to do as well as they can academically, to be challenged to be even better, and to apply their knowledge and skills to their lives; I want them to be bold, independent, and resourceful, and have sound judgement; I want them to have empathy, know the value of kindness, and understand that people want and need different things to be successful; I want them to have a determination to build a better, fairer, more responsive world. Finally, I want them to have a sense of belonging and a belief that this school in this town is, and always will be part of 'their place' in the world - the place where they grew up that helped turn them into adults that we all respect and admire.

3 Ups

It's almost the time when we welcome the next group of our littlest students - 2024 kindy kids will begin their 3 Ups transition on Wednesday July 26! The session will run from 10.40-12.40 every second week. Parents are welcome to stay with their children for as long as they wish, to make sure they are settled and happy before saying goodbye.

This year, we will be offering some special sessions for 3Ups parents. On the first day, July 26, all parents are invited to our first 'Parent Café' with the principal. We will enjoy some delicious coffee and you will have a chance to ask all your questions about 3Ups, Kindy, and our school. Details will be sent soon to all families registered for 3 Ups.

Most of the other sessions will be open to all families, whether they have a child at 3 Ups or not, and information will be sent to everyone. We hope you will be able to join us.

Problems and Complaints

Do you have a problem with something that we have done, or the way we are doing something? It doesn't matter how hard people are trying to get things right, there will always be times when they go wrong. Sometimes badly wrong, and sometimes 'little niggly wrong.'

If there is something that you are not happy about, big or little, it is important that you tell us so we can fix it. If we don't know about your problem, then we can't work with you, so please come directly to us, rather than discussing the problem elsewhere.

If you have tried to discuss your problem with us and you are not satisfied with our response, you may wish to escalate the matter and make a complaint.

I have uploaded our Complaints Policy to Audiri for your reference. It tells you how to approach the school about a problem, how we will respond, and how to make a complaint if you need to.

The chart below is taken from the policy and tells you who to approach. Remember, it is important to make an appointment so that the person has the time set aside to listen and work with you and can also guarantee the privacy that you will need. Trying to talk about a problem in a busy classroom or office, with your children or others around, is not productive.

Interviews and classroom volunteers

Our reports were sent home on Tuesday of Week 9, much earlier than most schools, to give you time to make an appointment with the teacher to discuss your child's progress. Only a few families have taken advantage of this, so next term, I will again be encouraging you to make an appointment. Evidence tells us that children do better at school when their parents are involved in their education and work with the teacher. An interview is one way to do this.

Another way to be involved in your child's education and see what is happening in the classroom is to be a volunteer. Several parents have asked for opportunities to volunteer in the classroom, so a sign-up will soon be coming out to you via email. We hope you will choose a date and come and help in the classroom for a while. Non-mobile babies are welcome, but if you have crawlers, toddlers, or preschoolers, they can be very distracting, and it would be helpful if you make other arrangements for them. Grandparents and other family members are all welcome to sign up, too, if they wish to.

Bus notifications


Please don't forget to tell us (and your bus driver) if your child will not be catching their usual bus home after school. Most parents remember to do this on days when they have special plans, but many forget on the days when we have events at school. Assembly days, or days like the cross-country when there are many parents here, can be chaotic at bus duty time. Sometimes we have made buses wait because we are looking for children, not realising that they have already left with parents.

Please also make sure that we know if your bus child is being picked up by someone else. This is for the children's safety and is part of our duty of care to them. It is also essential to notify us if a Kindy or Pre-Primary child is being picked up by someone other than their usual carer.

Have a lovely relaxing holiday. I hope you all find time to rest and enjoy spending time together. I look forward to working with you all again in third term (and I'm looking forward to some Spring weather before too much longer!)



Dance of the Planets

Just as our daylight skies are ever-changing, with new sunsets and shifting cloud formations, our evening skies are constantly changing too, as the planets of our solar system appear to move across the sky throughout the year. The word planet means "wanderer", given by the ancient Greeks who studied the night sky and began to understand their orbits.

From our perspective here on Earth, as the planets continue their never-ending 'waltz' around the Sun, their orbits can sometimes bring the planets together to form incredible conjunctions or 'Planet Parties'.

Across the month of July, stargazers will be treated to a sunset display as Mars, Venus and Mercury take centre stage. Starting on the 10th, Mars will appear right next to the bright star Regulus and Venus! Keen eyed observers may also spot the ISS passing by this triplet of lights around 6pm. Watch Mars drift away from Regulus and Mercury and take centre stage throughout the month, culminating in Mercury making a very close approach to Regulus on the 29th. Even the Moon will join the party, making a close approach on the 20th and 21st!

When to look: Earlier in the month, watch from sunset to 7.30pm, by the end of July, this event can only be seen from 6.00pm to 6.30pm.

Which direction to look: West north-west, very low to the horizon.

They will continue their beautiful dance throughout July, and this will culminate with another special grouping on the 20th and 21st, when the stunning thin slither of the Moon joins the party to form a striking nightscape with Mars and Venus.

Enjoy the cosmic views stargazers.
