Respectful Relationships Education

RRE is a program being implemented in many schools across Australia. It is an important prevention initiative to reduce family violence. It promotes respect and gender equality - that means building a society where men and women are equally valued. At primary school level, that means helping boys and girls know that they should be equally heard, valued and respected. In practise, it might look like making sure that boys and girls have access to the same play equipment or reading books where superheroes can be boys or girls, never criticising a boy for showing his gentler emotions or comparing sporting failure to playing 'like a girl', and acknowledging the importance of both mums and dads in caring for children and raising their families.

Along with staff members from Perenjori PS and many suburban schools, Ms Whyte and Mrs Millstead have been completing professional learning in Perth in the Respectful Relationships Education (RRE) program. On the school development day next term, the rest of the staff will engage in some local training provided by Desert Blue Connect. Then we will begin to implement this program across our school.

At primary school, RRE is not sexuality education. It fits well with our existing health and wellbeing program where students learn the skills and attitudes for building a strong, respectful, and inclusive community where everyone is valued. It helps students learn how to build healthy relationships with friends and family. It prepares them to face challenges by developing problem-solving skills and building resilience, confidence, and the ability to stand up for their rights and the rights of others.

And remember, never stop reading!

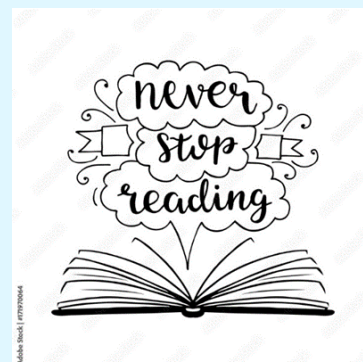
It doesn't matter how old you are. Reading expands your imagination: When you read, you enter a whole new world created by the author. You can imagine different places, characters, and adventures. It's like watching a movie in your mind!

Reading improves your vocabulary. It helps us all learn new words and understand how they are used. The more you read, the more words you'll know and be able to use

Reading boosts your knowledge. Books are full of information on various topics. You can learn about different subjects like science, history, animals, different cultures or how to build a boat. It's like having a treasure trove of knowledge at your fingertips, even when the internet is down!

Reading requires focus and attention, so by practising reading, you practice staying engaged with a story or information for a longer time. This can help improve your concentration skills. And it can inspire your own creativity. It's like fuel for your imagination!

Above all, reading is fun! So, grab a book or magazine or Saturday paper that interests you and keep on reading. If your children see you reading, they are more likely to read themselves. And don't stop reading to your children just because they can read. Even big kids love to be read to, and it's a way to share books, words and ideas that are still beyond their own reach. If you don't trust your own skills to read aloud, try sharing an audio book. They are available free from the public library (your child is a member), or online from an app like Borrow Box or Libby.

KP - Term 3

This term, the KP students have been busy practising known skills and learning new ones. In Math, we have been learning about height, length, mass and sharing. In English, we have learnt about adjectives, answering with full sentence answers, learning new vocabulary and working on our comprehension skills. PP students have been consolidating their CVC word reading and writing, and are learning about digraphs, which are 2 letters to make 1 sound, in relation to double letters. Some examples are the words 'less', 'fizz', 'off' and 'yell'. We've studied a range of books including; Stuck, The Gruffalo, Pig the Pug and Noni the Pony went to the beach.

We have also enjoyed having 3-ups start this term. Every 2nd week we've welcomed new friends, practiced our social skills and explored the work of Eric Carle. 3-ups allows our next year Kindys the chance to experience the school environment in a fun way, and helps prepare them for their first year of school in 2024.

Senior Class - Term 3

This term in the Senior Room we have been continuing to work on our independence and leadership. We've also cherished having parent helpers in our class, especially in the mornings to listen to us read. In English we have had a large focus on Speaking and Listening including preparing and presenting for Oracy and buddy reading with both peers and the junior students. Our understanding and perseverance in Mathematics has increased through hard work and focus. Most of us are seeing improvement especially in our morning daily mathematics and problem solving. We particularly like challenging ourselves to getting as many questions correct as possible in Mathematics so that we can earn a certificate. We really do love certificates here in the senior room and enjoy celebrating reading, spelling, grammar, and mathematics through the presentation of certificates weekly.

Room 4 Wrap Up

Jr Science & Art

Our junior scientists learned the basic anatomy of the eye and all about sources of light. They did HEAPS of experiments with shadow, light, torches, rulers, and made predictions and recorded findings. We always finish the term with a BANG, so in Week 10 Jr Science, we'll participate in ***Dino Zone 2.0***, to refresh our paleontology skills. Our art classes followed closely to our science theme creating abstract shadow artworks, decorating a *Magritte Eye*, and we viewed optical illusion art.

Our senior students became more familiar with the different sources of energy. They made their very own mini traffic light to apply their knowledge of electrical circuits.

Arts & Technologies

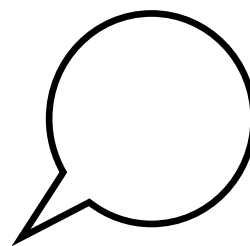
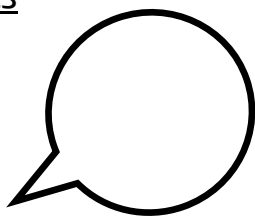

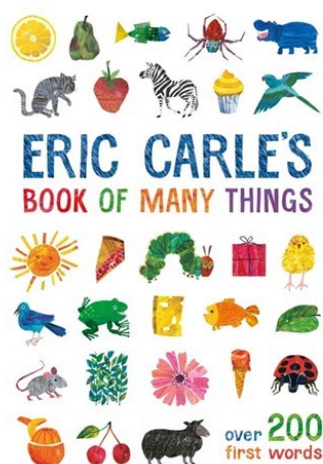

Ingredients

Drain corn kernels. Chop spring onions and parsley. Grate cheese.

Add corn, spring onions, parsley, cheese, flour, peas and pepper to bowl. Mix to combine.

Spray frypan with oil and turn to medium heat. Add spoonfuls of mixture into frypan, leaving room between each one.

Cook for 2-4 minutes each side until browned and cooked through.

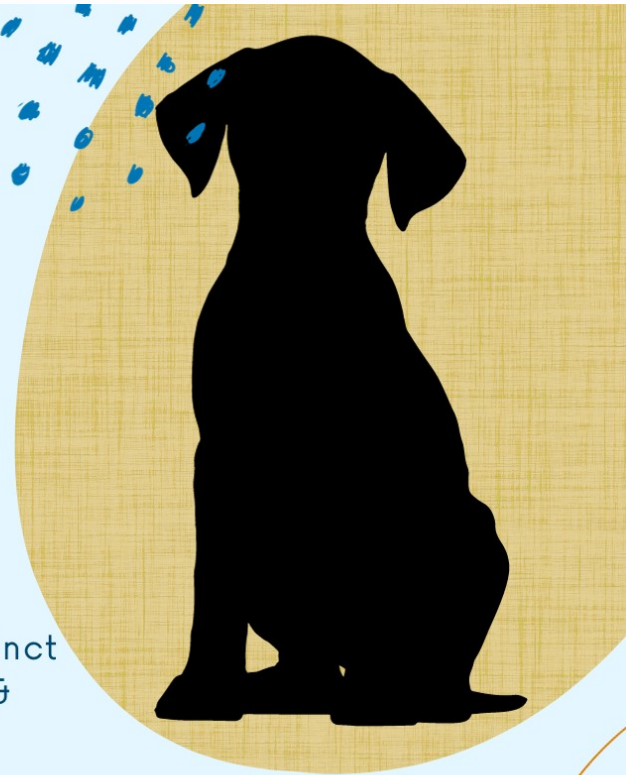
