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#### **Student assistance Payment**

The cost of living has skyrocketed and money is tight.

The WA student assistance payment is a \$150 for each child in kindy to Year 6, to help you get the things you need for your children. Fewer than half the students in our school have received the payment. Don't miss out! Download the Service WA app, locate your child's WASN (WA student number) on the cover of their last report and you are ready to claim. Please contact the school for assistance if you have any problems.

#### After school

After school, many families like to stay for a while so their children can enjoy the playgrounds. We know we have the best playgrounds in town, and we love to have you here.

At this time, please leave dogs at home if you can. Any dogs on school grounds must be on a leash and under adult control at all times. Some students are afraid of dogs and we need to consider their security.

Also, please ensure that your children are under your supervision. This is a requirement of our insurance. Children should not wander to other areas of the school grounds without you, and they must not enter the classrooms. Any teachers who are on site after school are working to prepare for the next day, and interruptions disturb their work.

#### **School gardens**

Many plants in our school gardens have succumbed to the hot dry weather. I have applied for another Seedling Bank grant and we will be holding a planting day soon to replace these. We plan to do some work to build up the soil in the front gardens first, and then plant tubestock - tubestock are smaller to begin with, but they establish more quickly and form better root systems than larger plants. We would like parents to help their children plant some of our tiny new plants - more information about the planting day will follow, once we know when the new plants will arrive.

I'm happy to report that most of the baby trees we planted last year have survived. All but two of those that were supplied by the nursery at Walkaway are doing well. Those that haven't made it were leftovers from tree planting on a local farm and had been in their little pots for a bit too long, I think. Mrs C took some of those home with her. She has reported them and is nurturing them along while she is on sick leave following her surgery. We will plant them out before the weather gets hot again.

A big thank you to Hannah who has generously supplied and planted a beautiful silver princess to replace one of the trees that didn't make it. Thank you, Hannah.

#### **School Board**

Coorow Primary School is an independent public school, so we have a school board. The board is made up of parent, staff, and community representatives. Its purpose is to support the principal to make sure that the school's plans and activities reflect the needs of our students, and that school resources are used effectively to support the learning and wellbeing of students.

Our board members, other than the principal, are:

Hannah Smyth (board chair), Jos West (secretary), Luhan van den Heever, Elly-Mae Curley, Emma Hegarty, Shannon Kenyon, Catherine McIver (staff rep), and Giulia Stangle (shire rep).

During their term 1 meeting, the annual school budget was explained to board members and they had the opportunity to ask questions about it.

At the term 2 meeting on May 27, I will explain to board members how we teach English, Science and Technologies, and they will be able to ask questions. They will discuss our progress towards one priority in our strategic plan (Creating a Safe and Supportive Learning Environment), and they will provide some input into our future planning in this area. They will consider our data collected from the 2023 National School Opinion Survey which many of you completed last year. Board members will also approve the new School Dress Code. The dress code applies to students and staff. It was sent home to all families on Monday. I hope you will read the code and if you have any feedback or suggestions, you can approach one of the board members before May 24 so that they can bring your comments to the meeting.

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#### **Queries and Complaints**

We try to make sure that the school runs smoothly and provides a positive and welcoming environment for children and families. We set high expectations for our students, and we work hard to help them to do their very best and meet their potential. We try to make sure everyone knows what is happening and when it will happen. Sometimes things go wrong, and sometimes you can sense that they are going wrong before it becomes obvious. Sometimes you just need more information. If you have a query or a complaint, please let us know. If we don't know, we can't fix it.




