Leadership News

The seniors have a 'leadership meeting' every second Thursday morning, run by Mrs Morcombe and Ms Whyte. They are participating very actively in all the activities, and we have been able to see them applying what they have learned. We were unable to run a leadership camp this year, due to financial constraints. However, the P&C feel that this is a very valuable event and have offered to fund one if we are able to organise it. We are currently investigating options for a bit later in the year and we will keep you up to date with progress.

More P&C News

The P&C has generously agreed to fund *Elements of Drama*, an amazing, term-long drama and visual arts incursion that Miss Stevens has planned for the children. Everyone from Pre-Primary to Yr 6 will be involved. Face-to-face and online sessions about all the elements of film & TV, including things such as costumes and props, will provide many exciting learning opportunities. Thank you to Miss Stevens for organising this huge project and a huge thank you to the P&C for making it possible.

ACTION Respect

Our school has been among a small group of schools selected to receive a grant from the Education Department to help us plan and implement a whole-school approach to respectful relationships education. This will support students to develop the behaviours, attitudes and skills that will make it more likely that they will have healthy, safe and respectful relationships throughout their entire lives.

The first stage of this project is to find out exactly what our community – the school, our families, and the town - wants and needs. Then we will be assisted to analyse the data that we collect and supported to design a meaningful response that meets those needs.

This is a long-term project that will take at least two years to develop and implement. Ms Whyte and Mrs Millsteed met with staff from the Education Department Tuesday, 25 February to discuss the first stages of the project. It is going to be challenging but we are feeling positive and excited at the prospect of making such an important contribution to the children's lives. Picking your Children up from School / Leaving Early / Delivering Messages

Recently, we have had a number of parents entering classrooms during learning time, and this can be very disruptive to our teaching program. Let us do the hard work for you while you wait in our pleasant air-conditioning!

Everybody has times when they need to pick children up from school early, because they have an appointment or family commitments. At those times, please come to the office and sign your children out. A staff member will collect them from the classroom for you. (Sometimes classes are not in their classrooms, so letting us know that you will be coming in can be very helpful! It also means that we can make sure that they have their bags packed and are ready to go, which will make your wait time shorter.)

Sometimes arrangements change and you need to get a message to your children. If you phone the office, we will ensure that the message is delivered.

If you need to check on your child's health or wellbeing so need to see them and speak directly to them, please come to the office and a staff member will get them from the classroom for you.

If it just an ordinary school day and you are waiting for your children, please wait under the arbor between the ECE (early childhood education room) and the office, or in the undercover area outside the staff room. Please don't go on to the verandahs near the classrooms windows and doors, as the children see you and this disrupts the usual pack up routine. It can cause classes to be delayed and dismissed well after the bell.

Mrs McIver will not allow kindy or pre-primary students to leave the room until she has seen their grown-ups, so if someone else is picking up your child on a particular day, please let us know. If someone regularly picks them up (nanny or grandma for example), Mrs McIver will recognise them and allow the students to go to them.

If you are picking up your child and you are running late, please give us a call. We can reassure your child that they have not been forgotten. Children can wait with the bus duty teacher in the playground, or on very hot or wet afternoons, in Room 4 (the red door at the far end of the verandah.) After school, you do not need to sign children out, but please let the office know that you have arrived before you head down to collect them.

Bus Changes - Notification to the School and Bus Drivers

Just a reminder to parents to please advise both the school office and the bus drivers if your child/ ren will not be on the bus because for example, a parent is picking up or they are walking to the pool after school. This is especially important on Tuesday afternoons when many parents pick their children up for sport, and on days when we have a school event and there are many parents onsite. It can become chaotic and unsafe for students if duty teachers do not know where children are and whether children should be on the bus or not.

French

This year, the Year 3-6 students are learning French online through SIDE (the School of Isolated and Distance Education). Many small country schools learn languages this way, as it is difficult to source language teachers. The lessons are supervised by Ms Whyte who remains in the room to ensure students concentrate and participate in the lesson and to provide learning support to students if they need it.

SIDE have also begun to provide support to smaller schools in teaching maths and science to older students in multi-age classrooms (classes that have 3 or more grade levels.) That means that the teacher can be teaching a lesson to some of the students while the older students are in the same room but receiving an online lesson appropriate to their level. Schools in our area including Chapman Valley, Leeman and Eneabba are trialling that program and we are watching the space with interest.

Faction Swimming Carnival

Coorow is hosting the faction swimming carnival this year, so it will be held at our wonderful new pool on THURSDAY 13 MARCH. Please update your term planners if you have not done so already. Information and permission notes were posted on Audiri yesterday. Please read the information on the note carefully, especially if your child is in pre-primary to Year 2, as we need information about your child's confidence in the water.

Kindergarten students do not attend school on Thursdays, so they do not participate in this event. Kindies are, of course, welcome to attend with their parents - parents are reminded that they are responsible for the supervision of their kindy children and other pre-school-aged children at the carnival. As usual, as a safety requirement the baby and middle pool areas will be closed for the day.

Due to Education Department regulations, I may need parent volunteers to act as supervisors to help ensure students' safety in and around the water. If you hold a bronze medallion qualification, a swimming teacher qualification, or a current first aid certificate with CPR, you would like a front row spot beside the pool, and you will not be supervising young children on the day, please let the school know as soon as possible.



School Values and Behaviour

Coorow Primary School is committed to practices that promote positive student behaviour. We know that when students don't know how to read, we teach them, and when students don't know how to do their mathematics work, we teach them. The same belief applies to behaviour. Our students are young and many of them are still learning to manage their emotions and behaviour, especially when they don't have their grown-ups around to support them and they have to do it on their own. It is our role to work in partnership with parents, teaching and supporting the children as they learn to manage themselves independently.

We support the children to demonstrate appropriate behaviour through our four school values: I am responsible, I am brave, I am resourceful, and I am a learner.

Being **responsible** means do the right thing even when no-one is watching. It means being honest, thinking about others, looking after everyone's property and the environment.

Being **brave** means making good choices even when it's hard. It means having the confidence and courage to stand up for what's right, learn from your mistakes, and try new things.

Being **resourceful** means being a problem-solver and thinking for yourself. It means knowing where and when to seek help. It means looking after our world and using resources wisely.

Being a **learner** means striving to improve and always doing your best. It means thinking hard and persisting, even when the work is difficult. It means accepting that people learn differently and helping everyone to do their best.









Our values form the base of our behaviour expectation matrix. Each week, we select a focus value and expectation. Teachers explicitly teach the expected behaviour, then continue to model and guide students' behaviour throughout the week, using a range of positive strategies. When students are seen demonstrating our school values and expectations, they are 'noticed' by staff, encouraged and praised. Students who need help to demonstrate the values are supported as they learn to do so independently.

You will soon see more signage going up around our school with our magpie mascots encouraging students' positive behaviours in different areas of the school. I'd like to give each of the four magpie mascots a name, so if you can think of any catchy little names, please send them in to me!
